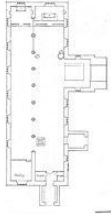

A Tour of The Church

	<p>The carvings on the main arch and inside of the west porch are probably Norman in origin and may have been added during the 1847-50 restoration of the church. Also in the porch are the village stocks.</p>
	<p>Inside the church to the left of the door as you enter, there is a copy of the letter of thanks from Charles 1 to the Cornish in 1643. After Charles II's Restoration, the letter was painted on boards and put up in many churches.</p>
	<p>The font is of a typically Cornish design with carved heads at each corner. It is probably a mediaeval copy of a Norman design.</p>
	<p>Tablet recording donation of £100 by Arthur Kempe in 1818</p>
	<p>Memorial to Major John Henry Gwatkin Trist died 1889</p>
	<p>Memorial to Major John Fincher Trist died 1890</p>

	<p>The only remaining panels from the rood screen that would have divided the chancel from the nave.</p>
	<p>This carving of St Paul is thought to be from the 16th century and was donated to the church in 2012.</p>
	<p>The east window is the only one to contain stained glass and was installed in 1902.</p>
	<p>The Memorial to John Trevanion is the oldest and most ornate memorial in the church.</p>
	<p>The organ was built in 1913 by Heard of Truro. It was re-dedicated in October 2013.</p>
	<p>This model of the 4 masted barque "Olivebank" was donated to the church in 1936.</p>
